
Every visit matters. Every drink helps. Even a quick stop makes a difference. Let's look after our locals this February and keep them open for the months — and years — ahead.

Lack of mobile signal in Eastcombe: The Parish Council believes that the Atlas Towers questionnaire does not address the concerns and angst of parishioners. A working group is targeting a response for February to produce a suitable questionnaire. We encourage ALL parishioners who have anxiety for a tower/s in the parish to attend the parish meetings.

Blanket reduction of speed limit - 20mph timing lies with GCC to advise. This was raised at the January PC meeting with County Councillor Gary Luff. We are waiting response.

Condition of road network: installation of patrol/warning lights outside the school in Eastcombe. A copy of the report undertaken and issued by Highways some 18 months ago has been requested. We anticipate an update from Highways at our next meeting.

If you feel there is a significant issue with the road surface anywhere in the parish, please go to '[Fix My Street](#)' and raise the concern - details are on the website. **This is key to bringing about a change to the road condition in the parish**, so please take a few minutes to raise awareness of potholes etc. Cyclists especially are prone to the dangers of deep potholes.

The drop kerb to the green: Partial funding has been promised from GCC Councillor Gary Luff. We are seeking additional matched funding to fully support the installation works. We will hope to begin work soon.

PC meetings take place 7.30pm on the first Wednesday of each month at Bisley Village Hall. All welcome.

EASTCOMBE PRIMARY SCHOOL

Warmest New Year greetings from all at Eastcombe Primary School.

Prior to breaking up for the Christmas holidays we had a fantastic last week at school with the children taking part in a range of fun, craft activities, performing in a fantastic whole school Nativity and lots more.

Years 1 and 2 in their D & T lesson investigated the purpose of windmills. They were given a design brief on building their own windmills and experimented with making their structures stable before creating the sails. Once tested, they had fun decorating their structures.

Hedgehog class finished their Antarctica topic with a talk from Rod Rhys Jones, who lives locally and worked in Antarctica as a surveyor, helping to map parts of the continent. During the talk, Rod shared lots of photos of his Antarctic trip, including views of the landscape, their Antarctic base and a photo of 800,000 penguins! He also shared a picture of Sir Ernest Shackleton's grave stone. The children had learnt about Shackleton in their English lesson when we read the ICE TRAP story. Rod

also shared some of the equipment he had taken with him on his trip, including his boots, gloves, and a fossil which they found in Antarctica, to help prove the Pangea 'one continent' theory. It really was a lovely way to finish our topic. Thank you, Rod.

We would also like to thank the café for providing shopping essentials, newspaper etc while Tesco Express is closed.

Frithwood Health Walks will be starting up again on Wednesday 4th February. This very popular walk starts at Frithwood Surgery at 10am and finishes at The Parish Centre for a tea or coffee, biscuits and a good chat. If you would like to join the group, booking isn't necessary. Simply meet at 10am on any Wednesday morning.

DISTRICT COUNCIL NEWS

SDC's Environment Committee in December approved the Council's new **Climate and Nature Strategy**, giving equal emphasis to climate change mitigation, adaptation to change, and nature recovery, while ensuring a just transition for all. The strategy can be seen on the council website [here](#). It was also resolved to review the Litter Code of Practice and call on government to make the current voluntary code mandatory (for supermarkets etc.).

Community Services and Licensing Committee in December approved refurbishment and equipment replacement at Active Lifestyles Dursley (formerly The Pulse); and approved receipt (and use) of funding from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Sport for Safer Streets and Graffiti Removal projects.

Council in December accepted the report of the Independent Remuneration Panel, recommending increases in councillors' allowances and some Special Responsibility Allowances. Basic allowance will increase from £6,608 to £6,966 in 2026/27, rising annually by £358 to £8,040 by 2029/30. (Although SDC is expected to be replaced by a new unitary council in 2028.) Minor amendments to the Constitution were also approved; and a new Vice Chair of Community Services confirmed – Cllr. James Boyle of Chalford. (I am chair of this committee.)

Licensing Hearings: Four panel hearings took place in December. Hearings by a panel of elected councillors are held when there are objections to an application. Alcohol licenses, with conditions limiting hours, were granted to Standish Gatehouse, Studio 18 in Brimscombe, and Woodchester Vineyard (an extension of hours); a taxi driver's licence was revoked following an incident in which the car left the road. All licensees are encouraged to take part in the 'Ask for Angela' scheme to offer safety to people feeling vulnerable.

Frithwood Surgery Patient Participation Group (PPG)

WHO'S WHO on the HILLTOP? We asked Alistair Noble...

The first haircut I ever gave didn't happen in a barber shop. I was 12 years old at home with Dad, with a pair of clippers from Argos and a lot of concentration.

My Dad was disabled and struggled to leave home, so we improvised. I was young, nervous, and determined not to mess it up. I didn't know it then, but that small act gently planted a seed.

Years later, I now live in Bussage and run my business: Mobile Barber Stroud. What I've learned is that many people don't want a busy salon. They need convenience and to feel considered, and that's why I go to people instead. Kitchens, living rooms, offices, MOT garages, scout huts, care homes - you name it!

Since moving to Bussage in the summer of 2024, the warmth of the village and the wider community has genuinely enlivened me. I've taken my service where it's most useful, working with local charities, care homes, individuals, and places like Brimscombe Mill, where I offer pay-as-you-can haircuts. I believe that dignity should never depend on fixed prices.

When I'm not cutting hair I'm writing songs, walking our greyhound Blake, or working on creative projects with my partner Lucie, who works at St Rose's School.

If you spot a white Smart car with orange logos, that'll be me. Please do say hello. It's always a pleasure meeting new people.

COOKERY CORNER

This month, Lynne Rhodes shares her recipe for

BANANA & CHOCOLATE CHIP CAKE

INGREDIENTS:

- 6oz (170g) margarine
- 8oz (225g) sugar
- 3 beaten eggs
- 2 large bananas, mashed
- 1/2 tsp vanilla essence
- 10oz (283g) self-raising flour
- 1/2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 1/2 level teaspoon salt
- 2oz (55g) chocolate chips



METHOD:

1. Melt margarine and sugar on low heat.
2. Take off heat and put into mixing bowl. Add beaten eggs, vanilla essence and banana.
3. Add all dry ingredients. Mix thoroughly. At the last minute, add the chocolate chips.
4. Put into a lined round cake or a loaf tin and bake in oven at gas mark 4 or 180 degrees for 1 to 1.25 hours. Cool in the tin and wrap in foil.
5. For the chocolate top: melt 5oz (140g) chocolate with 1oz (30g) butter. Spread onto the cake.
6. Enjoy!

RECYCLING REWARD!


Congratulations to Chalford Hill Primary School, who, in collaboration with Bisley Greenshop, were the 3rd highest volume Terracycle collector school in the country last year!

The school is a collection point for many hard-to-recycle items, including Pringles tubes and Ferrero Rocher packaging, receiving a small fee for these specific items from the firms that manufacture them. Sadly, the number of firms offering this kind of recycling for charity is dwindling, but the poster below tells you what you can still drop off at the school (please do not drop off anything not on the poster!) – and also which items and materials you can now recycle in other local places.

While not everything is eligible for recycling in our fortnightly kerbside recycling collection, there ARE now easy recycling outlets for many materials, including flexible plastics, now easily recyclable at most supermarkets. You can also recycling writing materials at James & Owen, in Stroud, dental products at Boots and blister packets at both Boots and Superdrug.

Thank you to all who continue to donate the specific items on the left side of the poster below to Chalford Hill Primary School, helping to raise funds for the school. Thanks also to Bisley Greenshop for acting as the area collection point for many years.

WHY GARDENERS SHOULD WELCOME A TOUCH OF FROST

As gardeners, it's tempting to want milder winter days - but should we? Our gardens actually need a period of cold weather for the plants to perform at their best.



Falling temperatures help to trigger dormancy in plants evolved to thrive in our climate, prompting them to die back and conserve energy over the winter months, ready to spring back into growth when winter has passed. Dormancy is part of the plants' normal growth cycle and without it they would weaken and eventually die.

Some plants also require a defined period of cold temperatures to trigger flowering and fruit production the following year. This is known as 'vernalisation'. Warmer winters would affect the productivity of many traditional crops such as raspberries and apples, as well as many cereal crops.

Scientists are working to develop varieties which suit a warmer climate, but don't be too quick to welcome milder winters. Without the cold, many of our plants will struggle to survive, and I, for one, would miss the beauty of a sparkling, frost covered garden.

VILLAGE HISTORIES... LIFE AS A STONE CRAFTSMAN: PART 3.

In this instalment, Paul Beer tells us about a frosty February in 2018...



From December 2017 to March 2018, we worked on a Cotswold stone roof at Sheepscombe, a job I had priced for Dr Delhanty on behalf of his mother Kate, aged 90. A gifted artist, Kate lived in a 15th century stone farmhouse on a hill overlooking Sheepscombe – the most characterful farmhouse I remember.



In the coldest winter since 1981-82, snow fell at Christmas, with frost most days and the temperature lingering around zero. We were fortunate that Dr Delhanty was a kind person who suggested that we should not have our lunch in the van, but sit in the kitchen of the farmhouse. Dr Delhanty showed us where the kettle was and gave us a key, telling us to have a hot drink mid-morning and afternoon, asking us to make one for Kate at the same time. At that time it was just our trainee Chris Wood and I working there: Andrew Beer was doing repairs elsewhere and really suffering outside – highlighting how fortunate we were to be working for the thoughtful doctor.

I had worked out that the stone reclaimed from two slopes, combined, would be enough to do one elevation. I worked out the random size for the second elevation, on discussion with the doctor, and he sent in our order to a quarry. He wanted new Cotswold stone 'presents' so the slope on the lane side was reclaimed split stone tiles and on the back elevation we were to use the new, thicker, presents (from the Forest Marble vein, near Tetbury). Stripping the roof off revealed that it was very old, with tons of lime torching under the slates dating back 150-200 years. Dr Delhanty had his own idea about roof insulation and was against fibreglass, which he did not want in the roof. He asked me about quantities and ordered his own sheep wool insulation instead. His reasons made good sense and we complied, although it would be our very first experience of using wool. We replaced many rotten rafters, with new oak sourced by the doctor.

On 22 February 2018 we were working in extremely cold conditions and had to inform the doctor that his mother was seriously unwell. He came and got her into hospital. Around 3.30pm that day snow started falling. We had heard the forecast and fixed tarpaulins over the front roof elevation. Stone tiling was in progress at the time – we had completed the rear elevation the previous week – and it was important to cover the laid stone tiles and also the courses as yet unlaied. That day we both left Sheepscombe with difficulty: the village lies in a sort of basin and all the lanes leading up out are very narrow. We could not return for a week, although Chris attempted twice. A week later, we made it back to the farmhouse and a day after that Kate came home. Dr Delhanty said it was lucky that Kate had gone to hospital when she did, but now he and she were glad to get back to how things were before.

We finished by the end of March 2018. I didn't know it then, but that would be my last Cotswold stone roof.


