
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CHELSEA ON YOUR DOORSTEP!

A group of 15 beautiful hilltop gardens will once again be opening for the National Garden Scheme on Sunday 4th May and Monday 5th May (the May Day Bank Holiday).

Located throughout Eastcombe and Bussage - with new gardens added every year - there is something for everyone, from small cottage gardens to larger designer creations, in a range of styles from formal to more relaxed, naturalistic plots, designed to attract wildlife.

Last year the NGS raised £3.5 million, which was donated to charities including Marie Curie and Hospice UK – each of which received £450,000. Of this, the Bussage and Eastcombe open gardens in 2024 made over £5k for the NGS and over £2k for local charities (Stroud and District Food Bank and Allsorts) via refreshments and plant sales. This year's local charities will be Brimscombe's Help a Hedgehog Hospital, Stroud and District Food Bank and the Stroud Swift



Teas and scrumptious home-made cakes will be served at Eastcombe Village Hall, with ice creams at Hawkley Cottage. Feeling inspired? Buy a plant or two from the village hall or from some of the participating gardens.

RTA Middle Hill: Unfortunately there has been a fairly serious road accident on Middle Hill adjacent to the allotments, where a young motorcycle rider was thrown off his bike after hitting potholes. We understand that the person involved sustained a broken leg and thankfully the ambulance service turned up quickly such that he was treated immediately. No other vehicle was involved. GCC Highways have subsequently filled in the offending potholes but it is a great shame that this unfortunate incident occurred due to a very poor road surface which had been reported to the authorities on several occasions. If you see any potholes of any significance, then please report them to GCC using the 'fix my street' application on the GCC website.

Annual Parish Meeting: This will be held at **7.30pm on 14th May at Bisley Village Hall**. An open public session where the Parish Council will give a short summary of the activities we have been involved in over the last 12 months, it is also an opportunity for members of the public to raise any topic relating to the parish or parish council. Local organisations including those which have received grants from the PC over the last year will be invited to attend. More details are given on the Agenda which is published on the Parish Notice boards and the website. At the end of the session members of the public will be invited to join the councillors for some light refreshments.

Village Green Access: Following further discussions with GCC Highways, the ward councillors are considering access directly from the road to the lower bench on the green rather than the installation of steps. By creating a path way directly to the bench this alleviates the awkward issues that were identified with steps whilst providing easier access to the green. We will now be gathering quotes for this work prior to proceeding. Please contact anyone of the Eastcombe Councillors if you have any thoughts on this matter.



Started in the 1960's as the Star Centre, a charity to help people with physical or mental disabilities such as cerebral palsy or the consequences of thalidomide, the college was the brainchild of a Cheltenham woman. It began with 10 students in Cheltenham, before moving to Ullenwood. Today it takes students with complex disabilities from 18 years old. The curriculum includes art, computing and technology to help with mobility and speech, as well as learning how to sign or signal the words 'yes' and 'no', giving students control over their own decisions. Learning to cook has led to the Star Bistro, which is open to the public. Eastcombe WI will be visiting.

Monica's enthusiasm earned rousing applause and she was thanked by Glenys.

Cultural Symposium: The council launched its Cultural Strategy with a daylong symposium hosted by Stroud Valleys Arts at the historic Brunel Goods Shed, with a line-up of speakers from Stroud and around the world. **The Strategy aims to support the district to harness the creativity of its diverse communities and generate more opportunities for people to connect, create and communicate, and unlock ways for creativity to contribute to a greener, healthier and more prosperous district for generations to come**. The symposium will be followed by events around the district, seeking to involve a wide range of residents, not only those who already create and attend arts activities.



CAROL'S COOKERY CORNER:

PRAWN & CHORIZO TAGLIATELLE

This is a simple recipe, quick to make and ideal for a summer evening. Serves two.

INGREDIENTS:

- 200g tagliatelle
- 100g sliced chorizo
- 150g raw king prawns
- 4 cloves of garlic, chopped
- Juice of 1 lemon
- 10g parsley, chopped
- 60g grated parmesan cheese
- 200ml yoghurt or crème fraiche




METHOD:

- 1. Drop the tagliatelle into boiling water and cook as per the packet instructions. Put to one side.
- 2. Heat a little cooking oil in a deep frying pan and cook the chorizo for a few minutes until crispy.
- 3. Add the prawns and garlic and cook for a few minutes, stirring occasionally - the prawns should turn pink.
- 4. Add the yogurt, lemon juice, parsley and parmesan cheese, reserving a little for garnishing. Stir together.
- 5. Add the cooked tagliatelle and toss to coat.
- 6. Add seasoning a little salt and a more generous amount of pepper.
- 7. Dish up, garnishing each portion with parmesan cheese and a sprinkle of lemon juice. Eat immediately!

REAP WHAT YOU SOW...

Growing something beautiful or tasty from a tiny seed is one of the most satisfying things you can do at this time of year, connecting us with the soil and



Growing annual flowers for cutting later in the summer is rewarding and you don't need masses of space. Simply weed and prepare the soil in a redundant, sunny patch of the garden or plant into bare patches in your existing borders to fill the gaps and add some summer colour. Make sure the soil is free of large stones and raked to a fine tilth then prepare a series of shallow rows (this will help you to identify the flower seedlings from the weeds as they germinate). Water your rows before sowing and cover with a thin layer of soil or compost. Make sure they don't dry out if the weather gets warm. They may need thinning out if lots germinate and keep an eye out for slugs! Easy varieties include Calendula (Pot Marigolds), Cornflowers, Nigella (Love-in-the-mist), Cosmos and Linaria (Toadflax) – all great for cutting.



If edibles are more your cup of tea, you can grow a succession of wonderful salad leaves over the summer months in only a small patch of ground or even a pot. Beetroot, chard, peas and beans are also easy to grow and some varieties are beautifully coloured so they wouldn't look out of place in your flower borders either!

NATURE NOTES...

I regularly get beautiful Bullfinches in my rear garden but I was surprised to see a new bird in mid-March.

Looking through my monocular I could see it was a finch, but slightly bigger with a larger beak. Checking with a birder friend, it was thought to be a Hawfinch, and, sure enough, it was a female Hawfinch, less colourful than the male but still with the striking wing marks of black, brown and white and a buff body and brown cap. I was absolutely thrilled.

I understand this secretive bird has also been seen in Cirencester Park and at Westonbirt Arboretum.

BisCAN: Eastcombe's Swift Box Project – An Update

Our first wave of Swifts should be with us early in May, returning from overwintering in Africa, a journey of around 4,000 miles. These early birds are the established pairs that use the same nest sites each year, plus those that paired and found a nest site last summer and this year will be nesting for the first time. We hope that birds which exhibited interest in the new nest boxes at the Baptist Chapel in 2024 will

establish residency as breeding pairs this year. We will monitor their activity with great anticipation!


The UK Swift population has declined by over 60% since 1995, partly due to the loss of the nesting sites; this is why nest boxes may help. But probably the main reason is the drastic fall in the number of insects, Swifts'

food, due to chemical insecticides, herbicides and fertilisers in agriculture, public spaces and gardens. The best thing we can do, in addition to putting up boxes, is to avoid use of pesticides and choose organic food as much as possible.

The approximate location of the Eastcombe nest boxes can be found on the fascinating RSPB sponsored app 'SwiftMapper'; known occupied nests from previous years are shown, together with records of 'screaming parties'. VILLAGE HISTORIES ... VE DAY on the Hilltop ...

As the 80th anniversary of VE Day approaches, how the hilltop marked the arrival of peace after more than 5 years of war...

Victory in Europe was declared officially on 8th May 1945. The night before, the log book entry of Bussage School recorded the historic moment: 'Complete defeat of Germany announced on 9 o'clock news by BBC. Tomorrow, Tuesday and Wednesday to be public holidays.

Margaret Mills, of Chalford, recalled: 'We were all got out of bed and...marched down the street blowing these little blower things. To be honest, we weren't that impressed and didn't want to be dragged out of bed!



On 8th May, the headmistress of Bussage School noted: 'I came into school at 9am to send a collection of food to the starving Dutch. Then I closed the school by hanging a 24 foot Union Jack across the whole front."

There was music and dancing in Stroud, while, on the hilltop, bonfires were lit, including on the recreation ground at Oakridge, along with fireworks supplied by the MP for Stroud, Robert Perkins, who lived in Waterlane. A huge bonfire was also lit at Bisley, where there was a special children's service and a VE dance to the music of the Eastcombe Forces Fund Dance Band, organised by the WI.

Once the children returned to school, more thanksgiving services were held, the Eastcombe School log book entry reading: 'The VE day school celebration took place this morning, conducted by the head teacher Miss W Smith attended by her assistant teacher, Miss E Rogers. The Chairman of the Managers gave a VE address suitable to the occasion, supported by managers and the official correspondent.

Ascension Day in May 1945 fell just after VE Day, and the well dressing at Bisley followed a tradition begun in 1919, with the wells decorated with a 'V' in red, white and blue flowers. Special services were held, attended by members of the Home Guard and Civil Defence, in uniform, while Eastcombe villagers gathered on the green for a united thanksgiving service, led by the Baptist and Anglican clergy of Bisley and Eastcombe.

VJ Day, 3 months later in August 1945, saw 2 more days of celebration. Eastcombe held a fancy dress parade and a concert 'attended by practically the whole village', along with a children's talent contest 'which caused great amusement'. The Eastcombe Forces Fund Dance Band - 'one of the finest combinations in the district' - again provided the music for dancing, with the event regarded proudly as 'among the finest village functions arranged'


