# Chalford Parish Council Local Nature Action Plan

## 1. Background

In July 2019 Chalford Parish Council passed the following resolution: "Chalford Parish Council declares a Climate and Environmental Emergency and pledges to do everything within its powers to make Chalford Parish Community carbon neutral by 2030 at the latest." This led to the setting up of Chalford Climate Action Group by the Parish Council in Autumn 2019. This has since become the independent Chalford Climate Action Network (ChalCAN).

The Parish Council works closely and co-operatively with ChalCAN and supports it with an annual grant. ChalCAN's Biodiversity group has a particularly high public profile in the Parish, and has initiated many biodiversity-enhancing projects, including tree-planting, working with local schools, managing wildlife sensitive sites in the Parish, contributing extensively to ChalCAN's informative website, and creating a 12km circular biodiversity trail complete with five information boards and interactive maps for download.

In **January 2021**, the Parish Council adopted its CN2030 Framework, based on Stroud District Council's carbon neutral Strategy Master Plan. The Parish Council's Framework included six actions related to biodiversity/the natural environment (see Appendix 4). Good progress has been made, but there is more to do.

**Frith Wood** is a semi-natural ancient woodland and is designated by Stroud District Council as one of a number of Key Wildlife Sites in the Parish. It has an area of around 9ha, the majority of which is owned by developer Robert Hitchins, with the remainder (about 2ha) owned by the Parish Council. Since **2021**, community group Friends of Frith Wood (FoFW) have been highly successful in developing community involvement, have set up two nature sanctuaries in the Council owned part of the wood, installed bird boxes, and has held regular productive volunteer sessions. FoFW involvement in the management of the wood has been valuable in providing advice to the Parish Council. Relations between FoFW and developer Robert Hitchins are cordial and have a positive though limited impact on the biodiversity of the Hitchins' area.

A map showing the location of Frith Wood and other Key Wildlife Sites is attached at Appendix 3.

Both ChalCAN and FoFW have been successful in acquiring **funds and other support** from businesses, grant awarding bodies and others such as Cotswold National Landscape (Cotswold AONB) and Gloucestershire County Council's Build Back Better.

The Parish Council has a **well-established grass-cutting schedule.** This was set up to ensure that biodiversity in the Parish was maximised, whilst remaining compatible with amenity use, road safety and public acceptance. The schedule is reviewed regularly. It covers land that the Parish Council owns, is otherwise responsible for, or has under licence from Stroud District Council, and land in the Parish maintained by Stroud District Council over which it seeks to influence the cutting. The current land ownership and grass cutting schedule is attached at Appendix 2. The Parish Council has a policy of not using pesticides.

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## 2. Building on a successful approach

It is considered that the way ahead for the Parish's Local Nature Action Plan is best served by building on the current successful community-based approach rather than setting up formal structures - experience has shown that enthusiasm is best tapped by people actively pursuing their interests rather than following an agenda set by others. The detailed action plan (Appendix 1) gives examples of local groups whose commitment, enthusiasm and knowledge can contribute to the Parish's action for nature.

## 3. Project team

The project is currently led by Parish Councillors Chris Gardiner and Peter Oakley, with ad hoc input from local community groups. Contact can be made through the Parish Clerk.

## 4. Stakeholders and communication plan
